Camino de Santiago Path

It arose in response to the search for an alternative to the Pyrenean Path. Many jacobites travelling along the Via Tolosana fell behind and rushed to cross the eastern Pyrenees looking for flat land that was offered by the Valle del Ebro. Also the Pilgrims who landed at the port of Barcelona and Tarragona after having crossed the Mediterranean Sea, were seeking the Ebro basin to begin his wanderings. The "Route Camino de Santiago" traps whoever runs through it, invites you to discover, from east to west, all the wealth that the city owns. Whoever gets into it, will see in his very eyes and discourse under his very foot industrial areas, rich areas of culture and urban environment of the city of Fraga crossed by the river Cinca, all giving step-steppe plain is the Desert Monegros.





Fraga

As Fraga is on the route between Tarraco and Caesaraugusta, it acquired great importance during the era of Imperial Rome, being witness to this the remains of Roman road found in Cardiel and the Roman villa of Villa Fortunatus, which highlights its mosaics and the early Christian basilica we can find there. The passage of time and different cultures have made Fraga a city that combines the Muslim heritage in its structure, the strength of the reconquest in the majestic Church of San Pedro, Renaissance elegance of Montcada Palace and the memory of the different wars. The legend "Faithful and Vencedora Fraga City" dealing on his shield, recalls the title granted by King Felipe V for having been faithful during the War of Succession. The Carlist Wars left their mark on the Church of San Miguel, popularly known as "Castell" for being military barracks during the conflict.

Route

We start the route at around Barrio de Litera, right in the territorial border with Catalonia. We follow the trail that runs to the right margin of the A-2 and leads us into the industrial area that forms the Logistics Platform Fraga. We leave this environment and turn right to follow parallel to the Canal of Aragon and Catalonia, which lead us to the Tennis Club.

Tennis Club

Climb the slope before it starts to re-download it and thus reach the N-II. Cross the road, and walk a few meters on the left shoulder of it until we see that opens a path to the right, which will lead us to the Industrial Fraga East. At this point the path splits; we continue parallel to the N-II to the cemetery, cross the bridge and get into the town along Calle Obradores until the central Paseo del Cegonyer or turn left and enter the village by the Camino de la Concepción.

City tour

From the Paseo del Cegonyer a drop pronunicada leads to Avenida Reyes Catholics, why hike to find a bridge that crosses the river Cinca, by which we must cross and thus get into the avenues and walks in the area Newest city. Continue along Avenida de Aragon, Garden Juan Carlos I and again Avenida de Aragon until the roundabout popularly known as "Roundabout Garden City", next to a red brick building. Turn right towards the Albalatillo Road and thence to Alcabón road passing in



front of the Courts.

Monegros Desert

Cross the road A-131 and we move between fields peach and pear on a path that, after crossing the ditch, brings us to several parcels of olive and pine trees that will take us down a slope to a plateau strong. After a sharp bend, another prolonged costs us about the cornice which marks the limit of the fertile valley of Cinca. Met flat and we enter the Monegros Desert following the departure street diagonally to the right, passing behind an old abandoned gas station. After about 6km, and very close to the end of the path, the path is lost, so we cross the N-II and take the track that opens on the left side of it.
